




HIGHLIGHTS

Dashain and Tihar Celebrated in Nepal!

The months of October and November are filled with Joy in Nepal as people indulge in the celebration of two major festivals: Dashain and Tihar. Dashain is the most auspicious festival celebrated by Nepalese throughout the country. People worship Goddess Durga, and also visit relatives, seek blessings from elders and enjoy deli-



cious food.

Tihar is the festival of lights that falls between October and November and is the second largest festival after Dashain. This festival lasts for five days and people worship Laxmi – the Goddess of Wealth - and light up their homes in hopes that Laxmi will enter in their house. People also honor and worship crows, dogs and cows for what they have done in the lives of humans. The last day of Tihar is Bhai-Tika – Brother's Day – when sisters worship their brothers and pray for their healthy and long life.

During these festivals, our volunteers and students in Nepal were also busy spending time with their families as offices and schools across the country were closed. At the end of the break, students went back to school to "hit the books."

Discussion underway to increase budget for post-10th grade students

An extensive discussion with area coordinators, knowledgeable people and volunteers in Nepal and the US is currently underway to increase the assistance for students studying post-10th grade. A final decision will come after evaluating the expenses of post-10th grade education, which is significantly higher than that of primary and secondary education.

Students who passed the SLC (School Leaving Certificate) exam, the national-level exam given to mark the completion of 10th grade, have two options: either to do intermediate studies or enroll in what is commonly referred to as '10-plus-2' studies. Finishing two years of either study is equivalent to finishing high school in the US. These programs differ in their cost of attendance and sometimes quality as well. Likewise, the cost of the program also depends on whether the institution is private or public and also on the field of studies. Students normally start to specialize in their field of study after 10th grade, and the costsof-attendance vary significantly between programs, i.e., expenses differ for medicine as opposed to sociology training. Another important factor that is important in making the decision to increase pos-10th grade support is the location of the institution, as some of the post SLC students reside in areas that have schools with higher cost-of-attendance.



Despite the hardships, Laxmi's father, as our field volunteer tells us, was very eager to support her education even if it meant sending her to a public school, which typically is of lower quality than private schools.
